2024 MFPA Annual General Meeting

The 2024 Annual General Meeting of the Malta Football Players Association (MFPA) took place on Saturday, 15th June.

Carlo Mamo, the MFPA General Secretary, provided an overview of the Association's activities and projects during season 2023-24, leading to the approval of the Administrative Report.

The MFPA's core events and initiatives were:

- Agreement with Assikura Insurance Brokers PCC Ltd who offer a tailor-made health insurance policy for football players;
- Launch of MFPA Strategy Paper for the period 2023-2026;
- Signing of improved MOU with the Malta FA pertaining to the sporting and technical conditions of women's national team players. For the first time, the MOU includes a parental and pregnancy support policy;



- Collaboration with FIFPRO and Learning Works to offer a diploma in sports management thus increasing the learning opportunities for football players under the MFPA's Life After Football Programme. The MFPA, through its network of academic partners, has increased the portfolio of courses, ranging from Level 1 to Level 7 (Masters Degree);
- Three Basic English Learning courses for foreign players, both males and females, and coaches;
- Membership Audit;
- Legal and administrative support to players on matters such as drafting of contracts, contractual disputes, tax issues and legal representation during disciplinary and appeals hearings;
- Free educational and information sessions on key topics such as mental health, anti-doping, administration of first-aid and use of AED plus a pilot session on safeguarding and abuse;
- Consolidation of the MFPA social media drive to strengthen the level of engagement with members and the local football community through features such as the MFPA Best XI, MFPA Fans Player of the Week, Fortify Player of the Month (men and women), and the launch of the Life Beyond the Pitch series;
- 2024 MFPA Awards which also celebrated 10 years of FIFPRO membership;
- Training camp for out-of-contract players.

POSITIVE YEAR

In his introduction, Dr Anthony Galea, the MFPA President, described season 2023-24 as another rewarding year during which the Association attained most of its objectives but insisted that there is always room for improvement.

"We've had another positive year from an administrative perspective and also in terms of the activities and events organised by the MFPA," Dr Galea said. "Our financial situation has remained very stable while we have also managed to consolidate our status as a pro-active association firmly committed to our mission to safeguard the rights and interests of football players based in Malta."

"There has also been improvement in the regulatory framework but we need to push for more changes to regulations which, in our opinion, don't fully respect the rights of football players, regardless of age or gender."

Expressing his satisfaction at the signing of an enhanced MOU for women's national team players, Dr Galea emphasised the importance of this agreement for women's football in Malta which represents one of the pillars of the MFPA strategy paper.

The financial report for season 2023-24, presented by MFPA Financial Officer Daniel Agius, was unanimously approved by the AGM.





All set for 2025 training camp for out-of-contract players

Strong response after
successful 2024 edition

The popularity of our annual training camp for out-of-contract players has been growing steadily over the years.

Since the inaugural edition way back in 2014, this training camp has become an annual fixture on the MFPA's calendar with numerous players grabbing the opportunity to kickstart their preparations for a new season and showcase their talent to potential suitors.

Building on the overwhelming response for last year's training camp, over 55 players, of which 31 are locals, have applied to take part in the 2025 edition which kicks off on Monday, 16 June.

The Mediterranean College of Sport in Birkirkara has been confirmed as the venue of this year's training camp. Darren Abdilla, who was the head coach of Premier League club Floriana FC last season, Matthew Genius, assistant coach of Valletta FC, and Saviour Darmanin will oversee the training sessions.

"The training camp is a great opportunity for out-of-contract players to build their fitness ahead of the start of a new season while exhibiting their talents to club coaches and scouts looking to strengthen their squad in the summer," said Mark Barbara, the MFPA Deputy General Secretary who co-ordinates this event.

"It is worth pointing out that several players who have participated in the MFPA training camp in recent years managed to secure a contract with a new club before the start of the season. A case in point is Dexter Xuereb who was offered a contract by his current club Hibernians after participating in last year's training camp."



FIFPRO-led head impact study

During the 2025 training camp, the MFPA will be contributing to an important study on 'Repetitive Head Impacts in Professional Football', led by FIFPRO's Medical Team.

The study will look at how repeated head impacts, like heading and concussions, affect players' brain health. The goal of this research is to gather clear data to better understand the risks and improve player safety moving forward.

More educational initiatives and support for member players

Education remains high on the MFPA agenda as the Association constantly encourages players to pursue a dual career pathway.

Launched in 2017, the MFPA's Life After Football programme offers educational opportunities for players to further their knowledge and academic competence. This programme has been expanded over the years with the MFPA teaming up with local and foreign academic institutions to increase the portfolio of courses offered to football players.

Season 2024-25 saw a consolidation of our education commitment as the MFPA offered scholarships, hosted English courses in collaboration with BELS English Language School for foreign players and coaches, and a Diploma in Sports Management with Learning Works.

The introduction of the MFPA Basic English Language Course in 2021 resulted from discussions with a number of Premier League coaches who noticed that foreign players who spoke little or no English were having difficulties to communicate.

During season 2024-25, the MFPA organised two basic English language courses which attracted 18 players, including six women.



NEW COURSE

Looking ahead, the MFPA is actively exploring ways to strengthen our education programme and this summer we will introduce five new learning units in collaboration with EduAlliance.

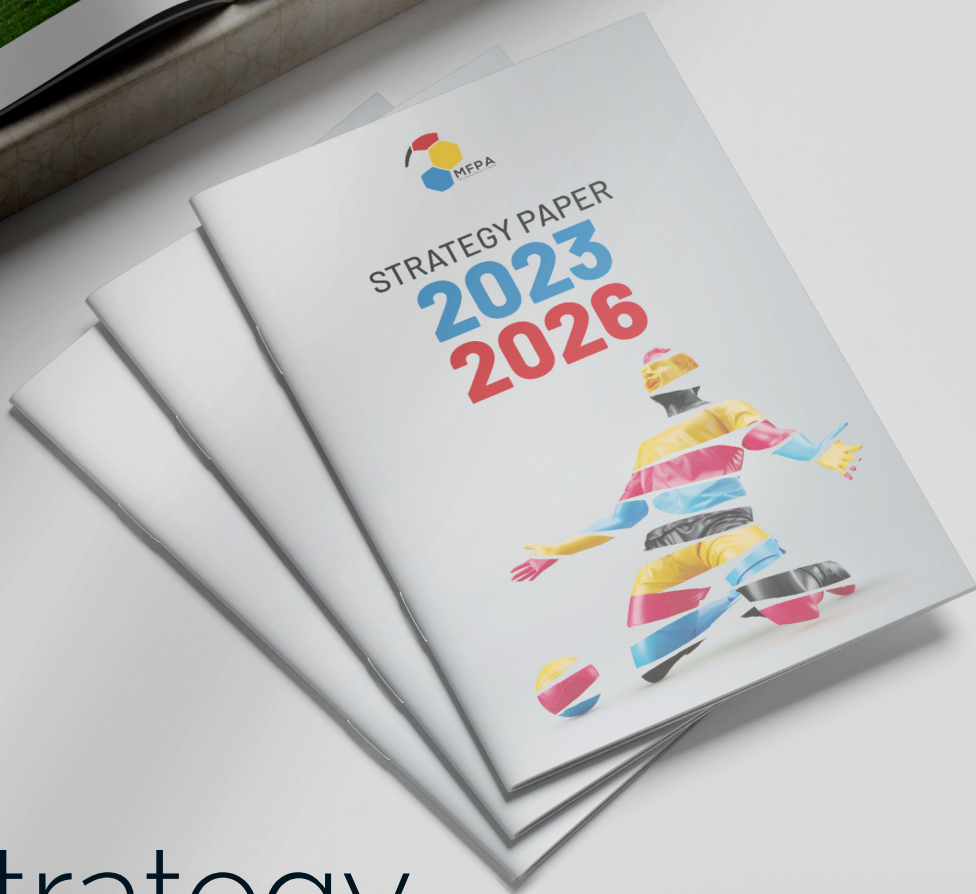
These will cover key topics for players, namely:

MFPA Strategy 2023-2026

Over 70% of the strategic actions and initiatives delivered within the first 2 years

The on-going implementation of the MFPA strategy for the period 2023-2026 is progressing according to plan.

A review of the fourth MFPA Strategy Paper midway through this season has shown that over 70 per cent of the strategic actions and initiatives have been delivered within the first two years of the four-year cycle. Significant progress has been made across the five pillars, namely:

EDUCATION

- First-aid and mental health sessions offered free to clubs;
- More opportunities for players to pursue scholarships under the Life After Football programme;
- English courses offered on a regular basis throughout the season to help foreign players;
- MFPA is exploring the possibility of offering Maltese language courses.

HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

- First-aider on site at every football event;
- Easily-accessible AEDs at football venues;
- Mandatory medical screening tests for players;
- Tailor-made health insurance for players available.

WOMEN IN FOOTBALL

- Better playing conditions – improvements in the scheduling of fixtures and pitches;
- MOU for the women's national team players comprises a new parental and early childhood support policy;
- Female players can now sign a professional contract with local clubs.

PLAYER SERVICES

- All services offered to players are now on the MFPA web app.
- A Mobile App prototype is being developed and expected to be launched shortly;
- Training compensation for players signing first professional contract after the age of 26 has been abolished;
- Minimum requirements for players' accommodation included in MFA regulations.

STRENGTHENING THE ASSOCIATION

- Membership registration, membership review reports and all financial transactions fully digitised;
- Over 80 per cent of professional players are members of the MFPA.





MFPA presents report on proposed Labour Migration Policy



The Malta Football Players Association (MFPA) shared its feedback on the National Consultation Document published by the Ministry for Home Affairs, Security, and Employment in January 2025.

This document includes 32 recommendations to improve Malta's Labour Migration Policy, focusing on third-country nationals (TCNs) working in Malta. TCNs are individuals coming from countries that are not in the European Union, European Economic Area, or Switzerland.

These recommendations and the report prepared by the MFPA were discussed during a meeting with Byron Camilleri, Minister for Home Affairs, Security, Reforms and Equality, on 11 March, 2025.

In recognising the importance of this consultation process, the MFPA regards the proposed policy as a good step forward. However, to make sure that the recommendations work well for football, our feedback focused on the specific needs of professional players working full-time with Maltese clubs.

The MFPA expressed its gratitude to Dr Camilleri and his team for their time and efforts, and Dr Kristina Busuttil for preparing the report on the MFPA's behalf.

The MFPA also welcomes the efforts to improve Malta's Labour Migration Policy and appreciate the opportunity to contribute to this discussion. We look forward to the implementation of the recommendations for the benefit of both football players and clubs.





MFPA part of FIFPRO delegation in meeting with European Commissioner for Sport

In March, a delegation from FIFPRO Europe met with the European Commissioner for Intergenerational Fairness, Youth, Culture and Sport, Glenn Micallef, in Brussels to discuss the 2024-2029 institutional term.

Focus was on key priorities to strengthen the competitiveness and resilience of Europe's football industry.

MFPA General Secretary Carlo Mamo was part of the FIFPRO Europe delegation which was led by President David Terrier (also President of French

player union UNFP), and included Portuguese player union President Joaquim Evangelista and Alexander Bielefeld, Director Global Policy & Strategy at FIFPRO.

"The discussion reinforces our commitment to a football economy that works for everyone," said Terrier. "We believe that strengthening the role of social partners and respecting collective agreements is essential for a sustainable and competitive European football industry that is built on a social contract between national and international competitions."

Key topics discussed during the meeting included:

- Strengthening the European Sport Model through robust social dialogue mechanisms and collective agreements that protect the rights and wellbeing of players as workers in the Single Market.
- Establishing comprehensive occupational health and safety frameworks, tailored to the men's football industry that protect player wellbeing and address the growing holistic workload demands on players, including match congestion, travel, and minimal rest and recovery time.
- The urgent need to improve governance in international football, tailored to the football sector and in line with EU policies and EU law.
- Addressing precarious employment conditions that still exist across the sector, particularly the problem of overdue payables, access to independent and swift justice, and insufficient social protections.
- The growing importance of innovation and technology in football, with specific attention

to the protection and use of players' personal data and the application of artificial intelligence at work.

WOMEN'S FOOTBALL

The Commissioner and FIFPRO Europe also agreed to continue discussions on women's football. As the women's football industry continues to rapidly develop in Europe, acknowledging the differences between the two labour markets and their distinct needs becomes critical to innovate the European Sport Model – such as the focus on competitiveness, professional standards, and specific female health, performance and wellbeing priorities.

Micallef said: "I'm a staunch defender of our European Sport Model. It is based on values and the principles of solidarity between the professional and grassroots levels, openness, and sporting merit. Governance methods must be improved, and they must become more inclusive."





Satarianso and Zammit secure top honours at MFPA Awards 2025

Triple delight for Birkirkara FC and Malta midfielder



It was a case of triple delight for Alexander Satariano at the MFPA Awards 2025 as the versatile Birkirkara FC and Malta midfielder became the first player to win the MFPA Men's Best Player and Best Young Player honours in addition to his nomination in the MFPA Men's Best XI for the outgoing season.

In the female categories, Shona Zammit captured the top prize after securing her second MFPA Women's Best Player award, capping a memorable season in which the talented midfielder helped Swieqi United win their maiden women's league title. Zammit, 28, was also named in the MFPA Women's Best XI.

The performances and achievements of the stand-out players in the senior football competitions during 2024-25 came into focus at the MFPA's annual event, held on Monday, 12th May, at the Radisson Blu Golden Sands Resort.

Winning the MFPA Men's Best Player and Young Player awards for the first time in his career, Satariano, 23, has been recognised by his peers after arguably the best season of his senior career so far. The Birkirkara FC captain helped his team reach the final of the Premier League and the final of the FA Trophy.

Satariano collected the highest number of votes with the other two finalists being Birkirkara team-mate Maxuell Maia and goalkeeper Henry Bonello who plays for champions Hamrun Spartans.

In the women's category, Zammit was named best player of the season, staving off competition from San Ġwann striker Hailey Russell and Valeria Villegas Caly, the Mġarr United forward.





Nicole Sciberras, the Hibernians and Malta midfielder, retained the MFPA Women's Best Young Player award, joining Satariano as winners of the best young player honours.

A total of 36 awards were given out during the MFPA Awards 2025 with 22 presented to the players who were selected in the MFPA Best XI for both men and women.



Floriana are the most represented team with three players selected in the 2024-25 MFPA Men's Best XI followed by Birkirkara and Marsaxlokk with two nominees each.

In the MFPA Women's Best XI, newly-crowned women's champions Swieqi United have four nominees followed by Knock-Out winners Mgarr United with three.



CHALLENGE LEAGUE HONOURS

The Challenge League honours were shared as Valletta, the winners of the second-tier championship, provided two winners, Timothy Aquilina (goalkeeper) and Brandon Paiber (midfielder) while Żurrieq players Darren Borg (defender) and Sulahmana Bah (forward) clinched the two other awards. Paiber, the

Valletta captain, secured the MFPA Challenge League Best Overall Player award.

The MFPA Best Amateur League 1 award went to Julian Azzopardi, the Birżebbuġa St Peter's goalkeeper who was prominent during his team's championship-winning campaign, while Rondinely Monteiro, who plays for National Amateur League 2 winners Victoria Hotspurs, claimed the first MFPA Best Amateur League 2 award.

MERIT AWARD FOR DORIANNE THEUMA

Dorianne Theuma, the former women's team captain, had a night to remember. After being named MFPA Best Women's Coach, Theuma was honoured with the MFPA Assikura Merit Award.

Regarded as one of the country's most talented female players, Theuma has been recognised for her outstanding football career in which she became the first Maltese female player to reach 100 caps for the national team, going on to make 118 appearances. During her glittering career, Theuma also won several honours at club level as well as individual awards.

Theuma retired from competitive football last year to focus on her coaching career, guiding Swieqi United to their maiden women's championship. She received the MFPA Assikura Merit Award from Mark Barbara, Deputy General Secretary of the MFPA.

The MFPA Awards 2025 were presented by Keane Cutajar and Amy Borg.

MFPA contributing to campaign about positive behaviour in youth football

The Malta Football Players Association (MFPA) is collaborating with the Inhobb il-Futbol Foundation (IFF) and the Youth Football Association on an awareness and educational campaign aimed at promoting positive behaviour among parents, legal guardians, coaches and supporters in general during youth football matches and activities.

In sync with the slogan of the campaign, 'Let Us Play – Our Dreams, Our Game', all efforts and initiatives are geared towards encouraging adults to support their football-loving children in a positive and uplifting manner, making the game more fun and inclusive for everyone.

Parents and coaches clearly play a fundamental role in the development of our children, both in football and in terms of character formation. While their incredible support and the sacrifices they make deserve our full appreciation, the urge to push their children to give their best, excel and achieve success can, at times, lead to excessive pressure which can have a negative effect on the confidence and morale of young footballers.

It is for this reason that the MFPA, IFF and Youth FA have come together to undertake this campaign which was launched during the Youth FA's annual Under-9 Festival, held on 17 May at the Rabat Ajax Ground in Mtarfa. A total of 18 football nurseries took part in the festival.

STRONG MESSAGE

Participating children held aloft a colourful banner capturing the campaign's objective and Josie Cassar, Director of Administration of the IFF, and Stephanie Rocco, the General Secretary of the Youth FA, delivered a short but strong message to the spectators.

"We all love our children and we want the best for them. Not only that, we will do anything to see them happy but let's be honest... Is our behaviour during football activities truly encouraging them to express themselves and become better persons and football players?"

"Positive energy creates a positive mindset but negative comments, shouting and excessive pressure affect our children's morale and mindset.

"The next time we enter a football venue, let's focus on being positive and encourage others to do the same.

"Change begins with us!"

The campaign will be promoted at selected IFF and Youth FA events over the next 12 months, focusing mostly on festivals, and activities involving nursery administrators and coaches. Posters will be distributed to nurseries to be displayed prominently in public areas. These efforts will be backed by a media campaign.





Governance review - Proposed structure prioritises diversity and greater input from active players

With help from ItrustSport, an international organisation specialising in governance, the MFPA has conducted a full governance review of its structure.

I TRUST SPORT

The proposed regulation amendments, which will be discussed at the 2025 Annual General Meeting, are intended to make our boards more diverse with the inclusion of independent members and members from underrepresented groups.

We believe these changes will improve the MFPA's decision-making and lead to better outcomes for our members.

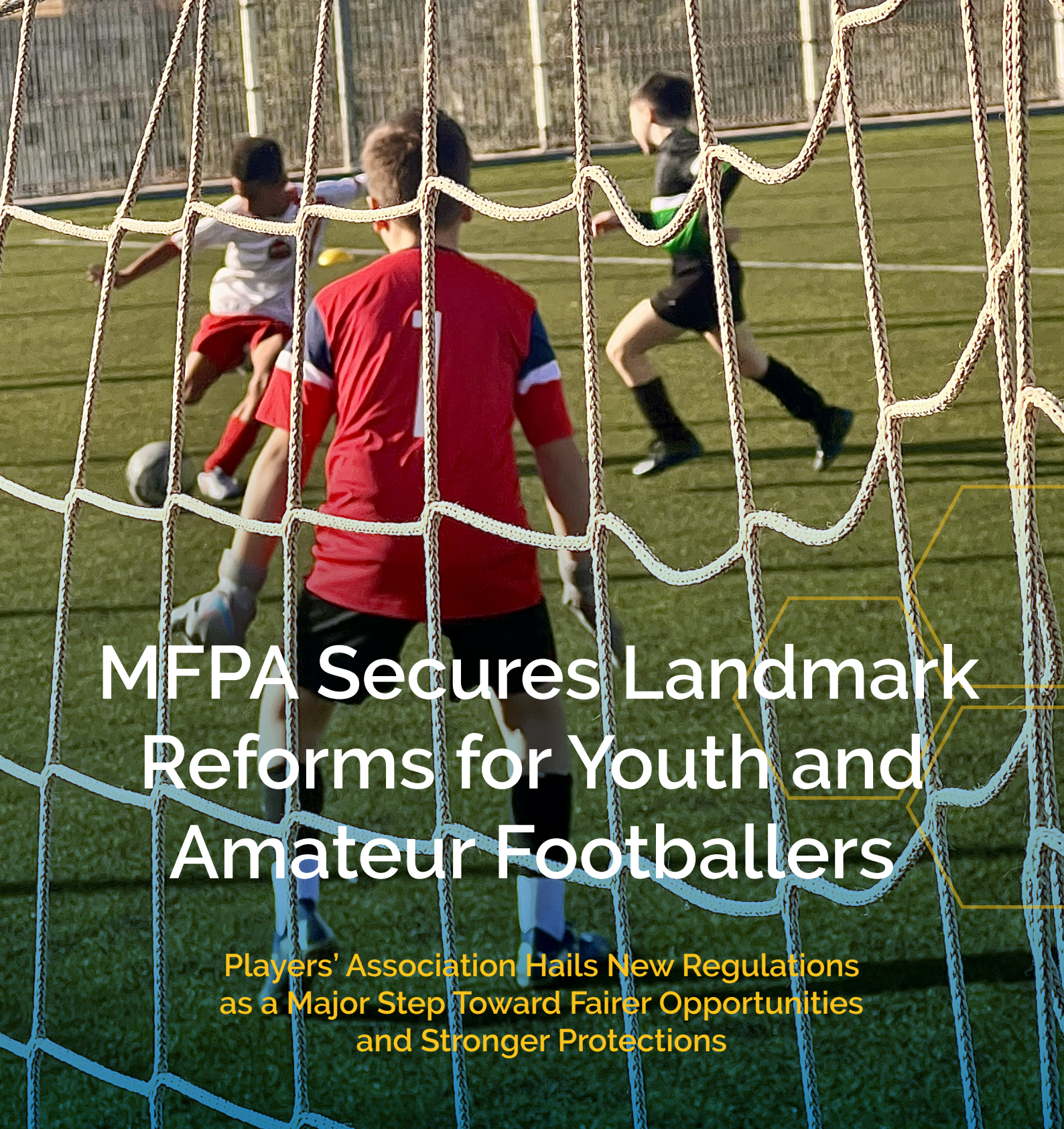
Another important development is the introduction of two Player Councils instead of the current one; one will be fully dedicated to women's football and the other will focus on men's football - both Councils will be made up only of active players.

A third board, representing amateur and youth players, will be introduced at a later stage, thus ensuring fair and inclusive representation across all levels of Maltese football.

This new structure will give players more influence in their union, helping us to map out a future driven by the players themselves.

"One clear message emerged from this exercise: we want active players to take an active role in shaping the MFPA's strategy," Carlo Mamo, the MFPA General Secretary, said.

"The new Player Boards are aimed at ensuring fair and inclusive representation across all levels of Maltese football."



MFPA Secures Landmark Reforms for Youth and Amateur Footballers

Players' Association Hails New Regulations as a Major Step Toward Fairer Opportunities and Stronger Protections

The Malta Football Players Association (MFPA) welcomes the recent amendments to the Regulations on the Status and Transfer of Players (RSTP) for youth and amateur footballers, approved by the Executive Board of the Malta Football Association on 26 May.

These changes mark a significant breakthrough, vindicating the MFPA's long-standing advocacy for fairer and more progressive regulations aimed at

enhancing the rights and opportunities of youth and amateur players in Maltese football. The revised regulations are the outcome of extensive discussions held within the Malta FA's Social Dialogue Committee, a forum bringing together key stakeholders from Maltese football.

This progress was made possible thanks to the courage of two players who stood up for their rights by filing legal cases with the Court of Arbitration for



Sport against their respective clubs, with the support of the MFPA and the FIFPRO legal team. Their determination and the legal expertise provided by FIFPRO helped to cast light on systemic issues affecting youth and amateur players. Following the agreement on the revised regulations, these two cases will now be withdrawn, a powerful testament to the impact of solidarity, legal support, and constructive dialogue.

The MFPA considers these amendments a vital step forward. Notably, the reduction of the obligatory registration period from four to two seasons for players aged 14 will help increase playing opportunities for young athletes, while also mitigating the risk of abuse and financial exploitation.

Importantly, the revised regulations will apply retrospectively. This means that players who have already signed registration forms under the previous rules will also be affected by these changes. All players will be required to sign the updated

registration form in accordance with the new framework.

Dr Anthony Galea, President of the MFPA, said: *"This is an important day for the MFPA, youth players and Maltese football in general. The amended regulations approved during the last meeting of the Executive Board of the Malta Football Association augur well for our future."*

"This is a positive development for our young footballers to thrive and make progress in their career. We also hope that this is the first step to strengthen the conditions of our nurseries by supporting them to become more professional and achieve further improvement for Maltese football."

Carlo Mamo, the MFPA General Secretary, said: *"Grassroots, youth and amateur players have always been a priority for the MFPA. The purpose behind these amendments is to increase their playing opportunities but this will not only benefit the players but potentially*

clubs who may have been encountering difficulties to field teams and compete in all categories.

"The key objective is to enable young footballers to play more as well as to reduce the drop-out rate as data shows that, in certain age-groups, numerous players are stopping to play football.

"On behalf of the MFPA, we would like to thank the media who have advanced this cause over the past few months, the researchers, the Malta FA, FIFPRO legal team, the players who had the courage to file the court cases together with their families as well as the majority of the clubs who, thanks to them, we have the youth nurseries where they offer training and learning opportunities for players.

"Unfortunately, the system as it was gave an advantage to the few who were abusing it but posed a disadvantage to the majority of clubs who were working in an appropriate manner. Therefore, these amendments will benefit not only our members but football in general."

Key Amendments at a Glance

REGISTRATION PERIOD

- Reduced from 4 to 2 seasons for players aged 14 and older (covering age groups 14–16 and 16–18).

COMMENCEMENT OF REGISTRATION

- Players registering with the same club can only do so after the end of the season. A new registration form with a unique code will be introduced as from the 9th of June 2025.

PROFESSIONAL CONTRACT FOR AMATEUR PLAYERS

- Amateur players offered a professional contract during the registration period may transfer to a new club during the summer transfer window.
- The player must be at least 18 years old, and training compensation must be paid (if due) to the former club or clubs in line with applicable regulations. No other conditions apply.

REVISION OF SQUAD LISTS

- U17 teams may list a maximum of 25 amateur players.
- For players aged 17 and above, the maximum is 40 amateur players, unless the club does not participate in the Youth League in which case the limit remains 25.
- All players who are not on the list are free to leave without any condition.



Other Initiatives

RETURN TO PLAY GUIDE FOR FOOTBALLERS AFTER CHILDBIRTH

Earlier this season, the MFPA supported an important initiative led by FIFPRO: the Return to Play Guide for Footballers after Childbirth.

This guide helps female players to navigate their return to the game, supporting them through both the physical and mental aspects.



NEW COLLABORATION WITH AIMS

In 2024-25, we've started a new collaboration with AIMS - the national Authority for Integrity in Maltese Sport, focusing on educational sessions for players and coaches on the risks of match-fixing and anti-doping.

The main objectives of these sessions are to raise awareness and provide players with the knowledge needed to protect themselves and their careers.

The first session, for players from Argentina and those with an Argentine background, was held on 2 April.



SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY – FRAME FOOTBALL AND DOWN SYNDROME ASSOCIATION

Our contribution to social responsibility initiatives has increased significantly in recent years as we strongly believe in the power of football as a force for good.

From supporting the Down Syndrome Association on World Down Syndrome Day to our constant backing for Frame Football, in partnership with Teamsport, our members are contributing positively to the society.



MENTAL SKILLS, FIRST AID SESSIONS AND SUPPORT FOR PLAYERS

Over the past 12 months, we hosted Mental Skills and First Aid sessions at clubs, provided medical insurance with the support of our partners Assikura Insurance Brokers PCC Limited, and continued assisting players on legal issues and drafting of contracts.

Suffice to say that during season 2024-25, we filed over 60 cases on behalf of our members.

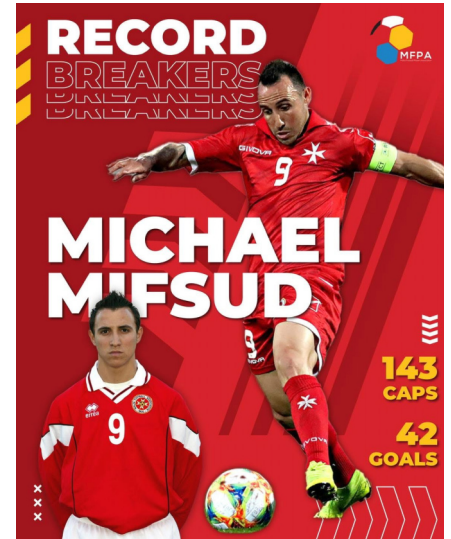
COMMUNICATION AND ENGAGEMENT
